§2457. Standards of Practice

D. Recordkeeping Requirements

~~1.~~ 1. Prescription/recommendation/order (hereinafter, “request”) for Marijuana

- ~~a.~~ a. A request generated, signed, and transmitted in electronic format which is compliant with the standards for electronic prescribing of controlled substances identified in [21 CFR 1311](#) (or its successor) shall be construed as a validly formatted request.
- ~~b.~~ b. The request shall identify the physician issuing the request as well as the person’s debilitating medical condition for which the marijuana product is intended.

~~2.~~ 1. When the pharmacy receives a request for marijuana from a recommending physician in written form, the pharmacist shall cause the form to be scanned and filed using an electronic imaging system in compliance with § Section 1123 of this Part.

~~3.~~ 2. Request forms (and electronic images thereof) shall be retained on the pharmacy’s premises for at least two years after the date of dispensing, and further, shall be readily retrievable upon request by the board.

~~4.~~ 3. Inventory of Marijuana Product

- a. The pharmacist-in-charge shall develop and maintain a perpetual inventory of all marijuana products acquired, held, dispensed, and disposed by the pharmacy.
- b. The pharmacy shall access the LMMTS and enter all ~~inventory-related~~ acquisition and product transfer transactions in that system.
- c. In the event the pharmacist-in-charge designates an agent to retrieve new marijuana product inventory from the production facility, the pharmacist shall verify the agent is at least 21 years of age and is eligible to drive on public roadways.
- d. The pharmacist-in-charge shall conduct an annual inventory of all marijuana products in the possession of the pharmacy on any date which is within one year of the previous annual inventory, and further, shall conduct additional inventory counts on the following occasions:
 - i. arrival of a new pharmacist-in-charge;
 - ii. discovery of any significant loss, disappearance, or theft of marijuana product;
 - iii. departure of a pharmacist-in-charge; and

- 41 e. Inventory records shall be retained on the pharmacy's premises for at least two years after the

- 43 § 4. The pharmacy shall develop and maintain sufficient records to fully reveal the business
- 44 ¶ 5. The board may require any pharmacy or its owners to furnish such information as the board
- 45 E. Professional Practice Standards
- 46 1. Recommendation/opinion/referral (hereinafter, "request") for Therapeutic Marijuana
- 47 a. The pharmacist may accept any request for a marijuana product which has been:
- 48 i. Issued by a physician in possession of a current and unrestricted license to practice
- 49 medicine from the Louisiana State Board of Medical Examiners as well as a current and
- 50 unrestricted state controlled substance license with therapeutic marijuana privileges from
- 51 the Board; and
- 52 ii. Received directly from the physician and not from the patient or any third party other
- 53 than the entity transmitting the request, either by electronic means conforming with
- 54 the provisions of 21 CFR 1311 or its successor, or in the alternative, by facsimile bearing
- 55 a handwritten or digital signature of the physician.
- 56 b. The request shall disclose the following information, at a minimum:
- 57 i. Name, address, and telephone number of the physician issuing the request;
- 58 ii. Name, address and date of birth (or age) of the patient for whom the request was issued;
- 59 iii. Identification of the medical condition for which the product has been requested;
- 60 iv. Type of marijuana product requested;
- 61 v. Date request was issued; and
- 62 vi. Signature of the physician issuing the recommendation, excluding any proxy or agent.
- 63 c. Requests for marijuana products shall expire 90 days after the date of issue, unless a shorter
- 64 period of time is indicated by the physician. A pharmacist may dispense marijuana product
- 65 on multiple occasions as indicated by the physician and needed by the patient until the request
- 66 expires; however the pharmacist shall not dispense more than a 90-day supply of marijuana
- 67 product pursuant to a single request. A pharmacist shall not dispense marijuana product
- 68 pursuant to an expired request.
- 69 4 2. Prior to dispensing any marijuana product to a patient, the pharmacist shall review that patient's
- 70 records in the state prescription monitoring program. The pharmacist shall resolve any concerns
- 71 identified in that review by consultation with the recommending physician.
- 72 2 3. Labeling of Marijuana Product Dispensed
- 73 a. The pharmacist shall not dispense any marijuana product that does not bear the producer label
- 74 required by the LDAF, and further, the pharmacy dispensing label shall not overlay or obscure
- 75 the producer label in any way.

- 76 b. The pharmacy's dispensing label shall contain, at a minimum, the following data elements:
77 i. Name and address of the pharmacy dispensing the product;
78 ii. Telephone number or other contact information of the pharmacy dispensing the product;
79 iii. Name of the recommending physician;
80 iv. Name of the patient;
81 v. Date the product was dispensed;
82 vi. Prescription number, which shall be a unique identifier for that specific transaction;
83 vii. Name of the marijuana product, including any concentration, strength, or other identifiers
84 of the marijuana product;
85 viii. Quantity of marijuana dispensed;
86 ix. Directions for use of the product;
87 x. Expiration date of the product, which shall not exceed the expiration date determined by
88 the producer of the product; and
89 xi. Other information selected by the dispensing pharmacist to inform the patient as to the
90 best use of the product for the intended purpose.

91 ~~3~~ 4. The pharmacist shall perform prospective drug utilization review and shall counsel every patient
92 receiving marijuana product every time it is dispensed, in compliance with the rules on drug
93 utilization review and patient counseling in Chapter 5 of this Part.

94 4 5. Reporting transactions to state prescription monitoring program. The pharmacy shall comply with
95 the reporting requirements as found in Chapter 29 of this Part.

96 ~~5~~ 6. Disposal of Marijuana Product.

- 97 a. A pharmacy may refuse to accept the delivery of marijuana product from a producer when it is
98 determined to be misbranded, adulterated, expired, deteriorated, undesired, excess,
99 unauthorized, or unfit for dispensing; however, once accepted by the pharmacy, no marijuana
100 product may be returned to any producer.
- 101 b. When the pharmacist determines a marijuana product is no longer suitable for dispensing, the
102 product shall be removed from active dispensing stock and quarantined in the pharmacy
103 pending its disposal, and further, the removal from active dispensing stock shall be recorded in
104 the LMMTS.
- 105 c. The pharmacist-in-charge shall render the waste unusable by grinding and incorporating the
106 waste with other ground materials so the resulting mixture is at least 50 percent non-marijuana
107 waste by volume. Material used to grind with the waste may include:
108 i. Yard waste;
109 ii. Paper waste;
110 iii. Cardboard waste;
111 iv. Plastic waste; or

- 112 v. Soil or sand
- 113 d. Waste shall be rendered unusable prior to leaving the pharmacy. Waste rendered unusable
- 114 shall be disposed of by delivery to an approved solid waste facility for final disposition.
- 115 i. Examples of acceptable permitted solid waste facilities include:
- 116 (a) Compost; anaerobic digester;
- 117 (b) Landfill, incinerator; or
- 118 (c) Waste-to-energy facility.
- 119 e. The pharmacist-in-charge shall prepare a record of each disposal, and that record shall contain,
- 120 at a minimum, the following information:
- 121 i. Brand name and other specific identifiers of the marijuana product disposed;
- 122 ii. Quantity of product disposed;
- 123 iii. Manner of disposal; and
- 124 iv. Signatures of the pharmacist-in-charge disposing the product plus at least one witness
- 125 who is either a credentialed staff member of that pharmacy or an agent of the board.
